FROM THE PASTOR

Do you ever wish life had a reset button? Perhaps you had goals for the new year that you haven't even begun to work towards, or a relationship that started off on the wrong foot that you wish you could start again. I know I think it would be lovely if I could just unplug myself, wait a couple of minutes, and try again like I can do with my electronics when they start getting overworked and sluggish.

The church year, in a sense, has a built reset button. Lent is the 40 days prior to Good Friday. It started in the church in the 3rd century as a time set aside for people new to the faith to learn about the story of Jesus and prepare for baptism. It was also a time specifically devoted to restoring people to the community. I love that there was intentional time set aside to repair the community through prayer, reflection and extra time together. Not only is there beauty in their commitment to community, it also speaks to the reality that being church is hard! Even the earliest communities of faith struggled with people disappointing one another, or needing a bit of time away.

No matter how you find yourself in terms of your connection to God and your connection to this community of faith, my invitation for you is to use the upcoming season of Lent, which begins on February 22nd this year, to push the reset button. My hope is that as we get together we can help one another unplug from distractions and make room for the restorative work of God in our lives and in our community.

Our Midweek theme will be: **My Well is Dry, Celebrating God's Provision in Dry Seasons**. During each week's evening prayer service, we will hear a scripture story that testifies to God's provision for God's people even in the desert.

ADULT EDUCATION

Have you ever wondered what makes Lutheran Christians distinct from other flavors of Christianity? Join us for Adult Education as we unpack 12 of the core theological convictions that make up the unique lens through which ELCA Lutherans understand God, the church, and the way we are called to live out our faith using the book *Lutheran Trump Cards: Playing our best hand in the 21st Century* by Dave Daubert.

The chapters are laid out like a deck of cards and include topics like: Six: Perfection is not the point; Eight: Worship is horizontal; Nine: Life is sacramental; Queen: Grace for us includes hope for others

MUSIC NEWS

We're off and running with the choir and bell choir. Thanks to all who are participating in our music groups.

Coming up for the choir we will prepare and lead a Choral Tenebrae Service on Good Friday at 6:30 p.m. 'Tenebrae' is the Latin word meaning 'shadows'. This musical service is an adaptation of an ancient worship service and is distinguished by the fact that the sanctuary is progressively darkened as the candles are extinguished.

The passion story of Jesus is read from the gospel of Matthew while choral anthems and congregational hymns are interspersed to comment on the story. You will notice that Maundy Thursday through Easter acts as one continuous worship service. There will be no prelude/greeting or benediction/postlude for this Tenebrae service. We will gather and leave in silence on this most solemn occasion.

We hope you can join us in worship.

The choir rehearses two times per month and provides musical leadership one time per month on the second Sunday. They rehearse on one Wednesday evening and on the Sunday morning before they sing on the second Sunday of each month. The exception is during Lent (March) when they will rehearse each Wednesday for 30 minutes.

The bell choir rehearses two times per month and provides musical leadership one time per month on the fourth Sunday. They rehearse on one Wednesday evening and on the Sunday morning before they perform on the fourth Sunday of each month. The exception is during Lent (March) when they will rehearse each Wednesday for 30 minutes.

Interested persons may join at any time. The schedule will be posted in our weekly email blast. For the vocal choir you can just show up. For the bell choir please let me know you're coming in order that we can have a bell position ready for you!

REFLECTIONS ON GOD'S WORD

Below are verses from February's Bible readings that made me stop and ask, "What is this telling me about my relationship with God and other people?" When time allows, re-visit the Sunday Bible readings. Look for verses that help answer that question for you.

Week of February 5, 2023

Isaiah 58:9b-11 9b If you remove the yoke from among you, the pointing of the finger, the speaking of evil, 10 if you offer your food to the hungry and satisfy the needs of the afflicted, then your light shall rise in the darkness and your gloom be like the noonday. 11 The LORD will guide you continually, and satisfy your needs in parched places, and make your bones strong; and you shall be like a watered garden, like a spring of water, whose waters never fail.

There's give and take in our relationship with God. If we care for others as He asks, He will take care of us. The challenge is putting others needs before our own. The more we do this, and trust that God will take care of our needs, the easier it is to focus more on others than ourselves.

Week of February 12, 2023

Sirach 15:15-17 15 If you choose, you can keep the commandments, and to act faithfully is a matter of your own choice. 16 He has placed before you fire and water; stretch out your hand for whichever you choose. 17 Before each person are life and death, and whichever one chooses will be given. Life is a series of choices. So is our relationship with God. In this passage from Sirach (a book in the Old Testament Apocrypha), Sirach explains that keeping God's commandments and acting faithfully are things we are all capable of doing. It's our choice whether we choose to or not. If we truly love God, we will choose to act faithfully out of gratitude for the sacrifices He and His son, Jesus Christ, have made on our behalf.

Week of February 19, 2023

2 Peter 1:16-18 16 For we did not follow cleverly devised myths when we made known to you the power and coming of our Lord Jesus Christ, but we had been eyewitnesses of his majesty. 17 For he received honor and glory from God the Father when that voice was conveyed to him by the Majestic Glory, saying, "This is my Son, my Beloved, with whom I am well pleased." 18 We ourselves heard this voice come from heaven, while we were with him on the holy mountain.


Being a Christian isn't easy. It never has been. The world holds many temptations and challenges to God's expectations for us. That's why a statement like this one from Peter is so important. It verifies that what we believe, and the way we choose to act as children of God, is based on the life and death of a real person, witnessed by men and women who chose to share the news of what they witnessed with others, including us.

Week of February 26, 2023

Psalm 32:3-5 3 While I held my tongue, my bones withered away, because of my groaning all day long. 4 For your hand was heavy upon me day and night; my moisture was dried up as in the heat of summer. 5 Then I acknowledged my sin to you, and did not conceal my guilt. I said, "I will confess my transgressions to the LORD." Then you forgave me the guilt of my sin.

When we are not honest with God (and ourselves) by acknowledging our sins, those sins weigh us down. Once we confess our sins to God and ask for His forgiveness, God lifts the weight of our guilt, freeing us to live our lives in ways that bring joy to God and to us.
