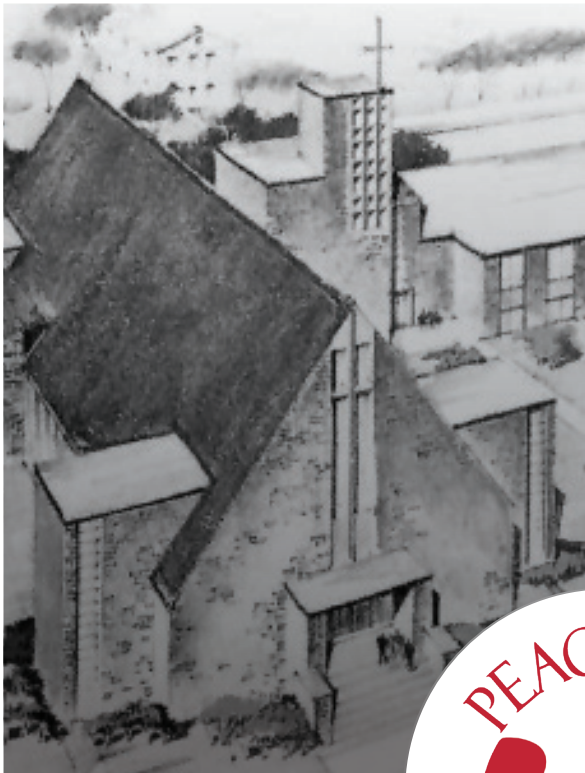

FROM THE PASTOR

*Jesus said, "Come to me, all you that are weary and are carrying heavy burdens, and I will give you rest."
Matthew 11:28.*

May is mental health awareness month. Historically, churches have been less than helpful when it comes to supporting people through times of mental illness by at best maintaining silence about the topic or at worst, spreading lies and placing blame. It's time to do better. Let's be clear about some things:

- 1 in 5 adults live with a mental illness. You are not alone.
- Just like it's not your fault when you get a physical illness, it is not your fault when you have a mental illness.
- You cannot, nor should you be expected to, "pray away" a mental illness. This is where the church has been the most harmful: suggesting that people experiencing mental illness are somehow weak in their faith, or not yet close enough to Christ; that if you just pray harder everything will get better. This is not how any of this works. Jesus is not a magic genie who magically makes you always joyful, and your life free from struggle. Jesus is present in the pain and makes a way through it, but the state of your health - physical or mental - is not a judgment on how "good" your faith is. Mental illness is real and manageable with the right help.
- If it feels like too much for you to handle, it might be. The phrase "God doesn't give you more than you can handle" is a misquote of a verse from Paul's first letter to the Corinthians that gets taken out of context and used to make people feel like they have failed if they feel overwhelmed by all the stressors in their life. It's just not true. We were made in the image of God who is Triune - who exists as a relationship. We were not made to do everything on our own. Sometimes we help others and sometimes others help us.
- Asking for help takes strength. You are strong, not weak. Sometimes we need help processing our thoughts and behaviors with a trained professional. Sometimes we need medication to help us feel like ourselves again. All of that is okay. Mental health professionals are skilled and compassionate and can help. If you're not sure where to find one, ask your Pastor. I am here to help.

If you want to learn more about mental health, the National Alliance on Mental Illness is a great place to start (NAMI.org). Be gentle with yourself and one another. God cares for all of you, including your mental health, and so do I!

FROM THE PRESIDENT

On April 5th, Deb and I had the opportunity to attend the For King & Country concert in Green Bay. We knew this was a Christian pop duo, but were unfamiliar with their music. The two brothers are a favorite of our friends from Wisconsin Rapids, and they invited us to attend the concert with them. The crowd waiting to enter the Resch Center wasn't your typical concert crowd. Ages ranged from 7 to 70+, a lot of parents were there with their children, and the messages on t-shirts and sweatshirts were positive and Christian. Once inside, you could feel the excitement as the crowd waited for the concert to begin. When the band hit the stage, the music was heart-pounding and loud which, as children of the 60s and 70s, Deb and I thought was fantastic! Although we didn't know the words to the songs, we were definitely in the minority. Most of the other 8,000+ people in attendance knew all the words and didn't hesitate to sing along with those on stage. Throughout the evening, it was exhilarating to see how For King and Country's message of love, acceptance, and inclusion presented through music and conversation was embraced by the audience.

Listening to music has always been part of Deb's and my daily lives. Seeing how this group's music and message impacted so many people reinforced our belief in the power of music to bring people together, especially around Jesus Christ. Music can be a powerful ministry, both on its own and as part of worship services. That idea is reinforced by what I see happening at Peace. Music gives individuals the opportunity to share their musical gifts, and by doing that, makes our worship services richer and more meaningful to a wide range of participants. All forms of music, from our organist and Instruments of Peace leading songs of praise, to our recently re-formed vocal, bell, and brass choirs, invite us to participate in the praise and thanksgiving that is such a big part of worship. This was never more true than at Peace's Easter service. I heard so many positive comments about the music played and sung during that service that I went to Peace's website, clicked the YOUTUBE link, and watched the service for myself. (Deb and I traditionally attend Easter worship with our two sons and their families at St. Luke's in Middleton.) People were right. What I experienced as I listened to Peace's organ, brass, bells, and choir (not to mention Pastor Maggie) was as meaningful as any other Easter service I've attended. Music is a growing ministry at Peace. 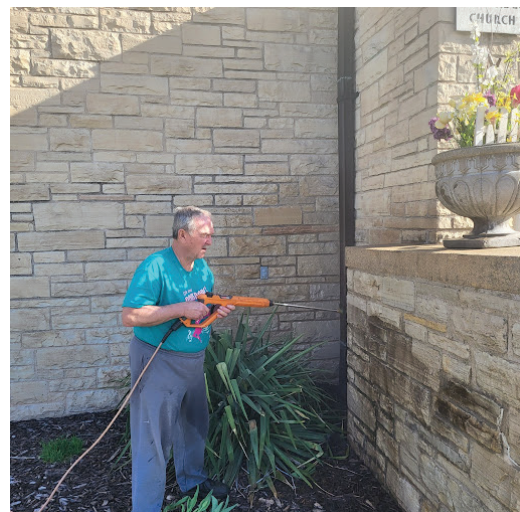

GARDEN TEAM

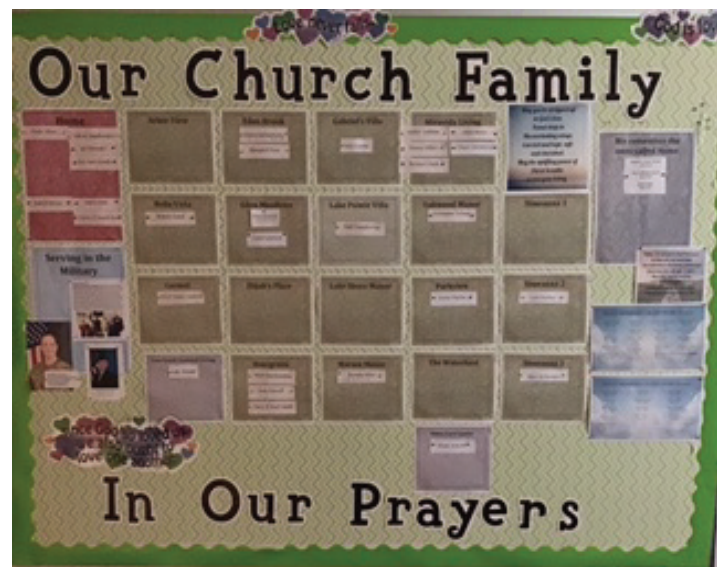

REFLECTIONS ON GOD'S WORD

The questions we start with guide the answers we uncover as we read the Bible. In my reflections during the last two years, I've started with the question, "What is this telling me about my relationship with God and other people?" In a recent sermon, Pastor Maggie posed the questions, "What is God doing here, and how can I be part of it?" Starting this month, I'm going to use those two questions to guide my reflections on verses from the weekly Bible readings. When time allows, re-visit the Sunday Bible readings. Look for verses that help answer those questions for you.

Week of May 7, 2023

John 14:5-7 5Thomas said to him, "Lord, we do not know where you are going. How can we know the way?" 6Jesus said to him, "I am the way, and the truth, and the life. No one comes to the Father except through me. 7If you know me, you will know my Father also. From now on you do know him and have seen him." *Throughout the Old Testament, God repeats His promises to the Israelites over and over again. And more often than not, they still don't get it. In these verses, God uses Jesus to once again try and drive home to the disciples who He really is. We don't need to spend time wondering who God is. Through Jesus we know. And, we know exactly what our response to the love He has shown and the sacrifices he has made on our behalf should be. Jesus showed us and told us.*

Week of May 14, 2023

John 14:15-20 15"If you love me, you will keep my commandments. 16And I will ask the Father, and he will give you another Advocate, to be with you forever. 17This is the Spirit of truth, whom the world cannot receive, because it neither sees him nor knows him. You know him, because he abides with you, and he will be in you. 18"I will not leave you orphaned; I am coming to you. 19In a little while the world will no longer see me, but you will see me; because I live, you also will live. 20On that day you will know that I am in my Father, and you in me, and I in you. *Jesus assures us that neither he nor God will abandon us even after he, Jesus, has left this earth. God will send the Holy Spirit, the third part of the Trinity, to live within us, to guide and strengthen us. We just need to open our hearts and invite the Holy Spirit in.*

Week of May 21, 2023

Acts 1:8 8But you will receive power when the Holy Spirit has come upon you; and you will be my witnesses in Jerusalem, in all Judea and Samaria, and to the ends of the earth." *Why does God send us the Holy Spirit? It's not to keep her hidden inside us. Rather, it's so that we use the courage and strength the Holy Spirit gives us to share with the world the news of God's love and forgiveness through Jesus Christ's death and resurrection.*

Week of May 28, 2023

Acts 2:1-4 1When the day of Pentecost had come, [the apostles] were all together in one place. 2And suddenly from heaven there came a sound like the rush of a violent wind, and it filled the entire house where they were sitting. 3Divided tongues, as of fire, appeared among them, and a tongue rested on each of them. 4All of them were filled with the Holy Spirit and began to speak in other languages, as the Spirit gave them ability. *The Holy Spirit gave the apostles the ability to speak in different languages so that they could share the news of God's love and forgiveness with a variety of people. God, through the Holy Spirit, gives each of us gifts that we can use to share that same good news. Our challenge is to discover what our spiritual gifts are, and then use them to fulfill the mission God has laid out for us.*
